There are four new heart-stopping thrillers, a real-life conspiracy—orchestrated by the White House—that destroyed an American hero from Western PA, and an inspirational memoir about a journey through the wilderness and the signs that pointed the way back from grief to redemption and love. As for the young and young at heart, there are three cool Pittsburgh cats who long to find their special sound, one French-fry-loving Allegheny Valley Police Department K-9 officer —a


Sophie, The Incomparable Mayor Masloff by Barbara Burstin.

"I'm frantic beyond recall," said the always forthright Sophie, who not only completed Mr. Caliguiri's mayoral term but astonished political experts the next year by winning her own four-year term in one of the hardest-fought mayoral elections in Pittsburgh.








Herbert's War by Ronald O. Kaiser.

Herbert, a coal miner's son from Herminie, named the most decorated soldier of the Korean War by President Truman, launched a one-man campaign to right a wrong war. When the Army and Pentagon failed to silence him, Mike Wallace and 60 Minutes stepped in to aid the Nixon White House in discrediting this outstanding soldier. Herbert's War uses actual documents and sworn court testimony to demonstrate how they brought down one of America's great heroes because he refused to be part of their lies and deceit. 
Fifteen Seconds to Fitness by Steven T. Gough, DPT, PT, OCS and Mijung Park, PhD, MPH, RN.






The Forty-Thousand Mile Man: Odyssey of a Pilgrim by George Florian Walter




Cairns by Joe Walko




POCKETS—The Problem With Society is in Women's Clothing—written and illustrated by Audrey N. Glickman

Though her unique wit dominates her book, the author does include a final chapter about her life-changing experience at the Tree of Life Synagogue in the direct line of fire, on the day of the shooting. 
WINTER COMES by Octavia Long

THE TAIL OF TWO BROTHERS by Rachael Schaeffner






K-9 Merlyn—Police Dog Extraordinaire by Leslee Green and Dr. Jennifer Callen-Naviglia.




THE PITTSBURGH THAT STAYS WITHIN YOU by Samuel Hazo of Pittsburgh






FIRST SEMESTER SUCCESS, SECOND EDITION by Arden Hamer of Murrysville.




THE CROSS, THE EAGLE AND THE RISING SON by former Pitt Professor, James Kehl




THERESE ROCCO: PITTSBURGH'S FIRST FEMALE POLICE CHIEF by Therese Rocco of Pittsburgh.




ONLY YOU by Dr. Carl Flecker of O'Hara Township
